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About Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film (AIFF)

Jordan's first international film festival that showcases Arab and international movies is long overdue. The Jordanian small, but vibrant, local film industry has begun to show what it can do, with talented directors winning international acclaim with features such as "Captain Abu Raed", "Theeb", "The Last Friday", "When Monaliza Smiled", "3000 Nights" and "Blessed Benefit".

On the other hand, Jordan is already firmly on the map as a filming location for foreign filmmakers, who choose to film in the Kingdom for its diverse landscapes, ancient heritage, urban mix, easy procedures, and government support. Movie-goers have been watching scenes filmed in Jordan at least since "Lawrence of Arabia" hit the big screen in 1962. In more recent years, the country has provided compelling locations for numerous international award-winning movies including "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade", "Rogue One: A Star Wars Story", "The Hurt Locker", "The Martian", "A Private War", "All the Money in the World", "Escape from Raqqa", "Aladdin" and "Star Wars: Episode IX" among others.

What it has arguably lacked is an exciting showcase for emerging Arab and Jordanian talents whose work is engaging a growing local and international audience.

The aim of Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film, according to its president Princess Rym Ali, is "developing and promoting an Arab cinema that reflects the creativity of the region and tackles the issues that are prevalent today."

The distinctive edge of this festival lies in its focus on first timers. The competitive section is reserved to Arab filmmakers and includes feature-length narratives and documentaries, as well as shorts. A non-competitive international section will showcase debut films from all over the world.

The line-up of this inaugural edition features 39 films – narratives and documentaries, Arab and international – including nine Shorts, from 31 countries. They have all been released in 2020 – 2019, showcased for the first time in Jordan, made by first-time directors or starring first-time lead actors or written by first-time screenwriters. 27 Arab movies will compete for the Black Iris Award for Best Arab Narrative, Best Arab Documentary, and Best Arab Short, delivered by an international Jury, while 10 international films will compete for the Audience Award.

The "First & Latest" section features the work of one veteran filmmaker, showcasing the process between his first and latest film. We are delighted to host this year Samir, the renowned Swiss filmmaker of Iraqi origin.

Whether you are a filmmaker, an actor or a critic, an industry insider or an enthusiastic consumer, **Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film** welcomes you!

About the Amman Film Industry Days (AFID)

An incubator that supports artistic and creative development, the inaugural edition of **Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film** is also the setting of the 1st edition of the Amman Film Industry Days (AFID), taking place between August 24th and 26th, 2020.

AFID hosts seminars, workshops and talks with industry professionals, which tackle challenging areas of the filmmaking process that Jordanian and Arab filmmakers face today in addition to sharing journeys and experiences by experts in the field.

Furthermore, and for its first edition, the Amman Film Industry Days showcase up-and-coming voices from Jordan and the Arab World through two pitching platforms for feature-length film projects: one for Jordanian and Arab resident filmmakers in Jordan whose projects are in development; the other for Arab filmmakers whose projects are in post-production; a total of 14 projects.

Selected participants will share their stories and pitch their film projects to an independent jury who will award the best projects to help bring their films to completion. AFID Award Announcement, concluding the Amman Film Industry Days, will take place on August 26th, 2020.

Welcome Note

It was never going to be a typical film festival. The pandemic made it even less so. So, it may seem a strange year to launch the first edition of a Film Festival anywhere in the world.

We, in Jordan, had already worked on many initiatives to encourage first-time filmmakers, mainly thanks to the efforts of the Royal Film Commission-Jordan (RFC), which continues to offer support with funding, capacity-building, and developing a film culture in our country. But we knew those first films and the artists who made them deserved more.

The Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film (AIFF) was established to respond to this need: to encourage first-time filmmakers and provide them with opportunities to engage both audiences and professionals.

The health crisis led us to postpone and rethink the festival that was scheduled in April 2020. Should we put everything on hold and wait for normal life to resume? Is another film festival what our country and region need in such dire and uncertain times?

After much pondering, we realized that the very filmmakers that the festival wanted to celebrate actually held the answer. Indeed, they all share one extraordinary trait: undeterrable resolve. The energy and determination they demonstrate in lifting their films off the ground boggle the mind. And we thought we should borrow this resolve from them and march on.

Audiences - in Jordan and elsewhere - also provided us with answers. As the public retreated within the confines of their homes, the need for stories to be told and films to be shared only grew. Not only as entertainment, but also as a way to connect with friends, family, community and the world. As a way to ponder on the human condition that was, yet again, challenged and as a way to travel while staying at home.

We, at the AIFF, believe that access to culture, no matter the medium, is worth having. We also believe that access to culture is not a luxury left for better days. Culture in general, and film in particular, is a constant need.

But, we also believe that for its full appreciation, cinema remains one of those art forms that demand a public and therefore a public space. A belief that the sanitary crisis has challenged but that we started working on actively as we decided to set the AIFF on its course for its first edition.

Not being able to use closed cinemas, we wanted to make certain that the first works of our Arab artists this year would still be seen on a large screen and by as large a number of people as possible: drive-in screening spaces seemed like the perfect solution; organised for the first time in Jordan, for our first international film festival, celebrating first-time filmmakers.

We also sought permission to screen some films at the open-air venue of the Royal Film Commission, cutting by half the number of seats to respect social distancing. Though not comparable with the majestic ancient amphitheatres in Umm Qays, Jerash, Amman and Petra, the RFC's open-air theatre was built specifically for film screenings, more than a decade ago. We like to think that, in some way, all these venues fall in line with our country's and our region's rich and ancient tradition of storytelling. Although we spared no effort to offer the best possible screening conditions, we believe the size of the space or the screen matter much less than the content they offer.

We all have a stake in the success of our filmmakers. Whether we worry about the global impact of competing cultures through film, or whether we merely want to see stories that reflect our concerns, hear our voices, and share them.

By supporting filmmakers, we support our right to remember our recent history, for generations to come, to reflect on it, and be the ones in charge of our narratives. More importantly, film is also a possibility to reflect on what shared future we want. And who, better than first-time filmmakers, to embody this future?

This festival offers us all an opportunity to act on that.

To the rather atypical way of telling stories, was added this year the atypical character of how the year has unfolded for the global film industry. While mostly online, the support, guidance, and possibilities for feedback did not entirely disappear, and we hope they will return in full force, along with in-person networking possibilities, next year.

But that is also where the audience steps in. Without a public, we cannot hope to develop film as an art form and as an industry in our country.

These films all need your critical eye, and that of the jury and, more than anything, they need to be shared and heard about. They need the support of everyone, specialists and amateurs alike.

We are grateful to all those participating in this event: the members of the jury, and experts who, wherever they are in the world, continued their support; to the film community; to the team that made this possible, despite the usual as well as the unforeseen challenges; and of course, to our sponsors, without whom this event would not take place. A special mention to the Royal Film Commission, and HRH Prince Ali, who founded it in 2003, with a vision to launch a proper film industry in our beloved country. The AIFF is part and parcel of that vision.

Thank you all for joining us for this first edition of the **Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film**, and for appreciating the magic of the silver screen.

Welcome Note

We started brainstorming about this festival a couple of years ago, and have been actively preparing for it for over ten months, shaping its presence and identity. It never occurred to us that events would unfold so dramatically, with an unprecedented global health crisis that brought life almost to a standstill, and forced us to postpone its first edition. We never thought either that the world, and the region in particular, would be facing so many uncertainties and ordeals, as we were approaching the festival's opening date.

A festival is by definition festive. One could rightfully ask in these unusual times: what are we celebrating? To that, we say: Cinema...as "cinema is life, and vice versa" (Sergio Leone). As we cannot stop life, we cannot stop cinema from mirroring it and narrating it in its various dimensions. And a film festival is a platform for stories to be told and shared. It is an occasion to laugh and be moved, to meet and discuss. It is an opportunity for talent to be discovered, acknowledged, and acclaimed. It is at the essence of the meaning of culture. It is what we need in this unstable period, helping us cope and heal if need be, giving us a sense of purpose and identity as humans, no matter where we live or where we are from.



"I don't think it is necessary to separate all the borders of divisions, if we pursue the beauty of cinema." This quote, by the multi-awarded South-Korean director Bong Joon-Ho, reminds us of the universal language of film and its ability to break down geographic, cultural, and social barriers. Our hope is that this Jordanian event will celebrate our differences as well as our commonalities, with a greater acceptance of the Other.

This festival was designed with a specific "edge", one that focuses on first timers. This makes sense more than ever, as so much hope lies in these new voices that can bring the changes needed for a better future.

Stories, be they real or fictional, are there to make us reflect and ponder. Support to filmmakers – whether by showcasing their work or helping them produce it – is essential to sustain these emerging talents in which we believe. In fact, some of the best Arab productions in the past couple of years have been the work of first-time filmmakers, which by itself is a positive and promising sign of our times.

This festival wouldn't have seen the light without the genuine and constant support of every single Board member, the commitment and trust of every sponsor and partner, the seriousness and flexibility of the Jurors, the indefectible assistance of all the friends and colleagues at the Royal Film Commission - Jordan and, above all, the dedication and enthusiasm of its working team (a very small team, might I add!). I would like to thank them for their efforts, their ideas, their resolve and professionalism.

The inaugural edition of Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film is happening against all odds, necessitating even more determination and resourcefulness than previously planned. It is our hope that, next year, we will celebrate the art of cinema in a more diverse gathering, with quests and colleagues from beyond our borders sharing this unique moment.

Until then, we trust that the film professionals will take advantage of the activities organized for their benefit and that the audience in Amman will enjoy this carefully selected line-up of Arab and international movies – 39 films produced, or co-produced, in 31 countries.

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
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The Black Tris Trophy Mohanna Durra



Jordan's foremost artist, Mohanna Durra designed the bronze trophy of Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film (AIFF) in the shape of the Black Iris, Jordan's national flower and AIFF's symbol.

The iris' beautiful and intricate shape parallels the creative complexity and inspiration that goes into the craft of filmmaking. Three trophies will be awarded to Arab movies during the festival for: Best Feature-Length Narrative, Best Feature-Length Documentary, and Best Short Film.

Durra, in his design of the trophy avoided photographic realism. He synthesized the complex outlines of the Iris into a simple form that inspires the beholder and carries him to a world of inspiration; all this without losing any of the dynamism or vitality of the Black Iris which blooms with its beauty in Jordan's countryside.

Mohanna Durra is regarded as Jordan's pioneer of modern art. He was the first to introduce Abstract Art and Cubism having mastered classical painting skills. His portraits and particularly those of the desert Bedouins, for which he is highly appreciated, are displayed at the National Gallery of Fine Arts in Jordan, in public and private collections and also appear on postage stamps.

At the young age of 17, Durra won a scholarship to study at the Academy of Fine Arts in Rome. Following his graduation in 1958, he returned to Jordan and began a journey of self-discovery and artistic expression through painting. He founded the Institute of Fine Arts in 1970 which set the path for hundreds of young Jordanian talents. His paintings were exhibited worldwide, and he continued to paint while pursuing a diplomatic career with the Arab League as Ambassador in Rome and Moscow. His eightieth birthday was celebrated by Jordan in 2018 through a retrospective exhibition of his works at Jordan's National Gallery of Fine Arts showing works since the tender age of 10 when he first started painting.

Having paved the way for many firsts in the Jordanian Fine Art scene, Durra leaves his mark on the **Amman International Film Festival** – **Awal Film** that acknowledges first-time achievements and is the first of its kind in Jordan.





Ennio Morricone, also known as *il maestro*, is one of the greatest and most versatile film composers and orchestrators of all times. With some 500 film scores that transcend cultural and artistic genres, he is quoted saying: "I'm not linked to one genre or another. I like to change, so there's no risk of getting bored."

From romance to action to western scores, Morricone's film scores went on to earn him multiple awards, including an Oscar for Best Achievement in Music, an honorary Oscar for his magnificent and multifaceted contributions to the art of film music, three Golden Globes, six BAFTA awards, two Grammy Awards, and several other international awards.

Morricone was born in Rome in 1928. He studied at Rome's Santa Cecilia Conservatory, where he specialized in trumpet. Working with a small budget, Morricone revolutionized film scoring by finding an alternative to the full orchestrated music of the Hollywood Westerns. While his earlier scores did not garner much attention, he rose to fame with the unique composition of music and sound effects for Sergio Leone's so-called Spaghetti Westerns in the 1960s: "A Fistful of Dollars" (1964), "For a Few Dollars More" (1965), "The Good, The Bad and The Ugly" (1966) considered to be one of the most influential soundtracks in history, "Once Upon a Time in The West" (1968) one of the best-selling scores worldwide and "A Fistful of Dynamite" (1971), only to name a few.

In 1978, Morricone composed the music of "Days of Heaven", by Terrence Malick, for which he earned his first nomination at the Academy Awards for Best Original Score. In 1988, he worked with director Giuseppe Tornatore for the award-winning drama "Cinema Paradiso". Since then, they worked together on eight films including "The Legend of 1998) "1900) and "Malèna" (2000). Later on, his work with director Quentin Tarantino earned him the Academy Award for Best Original Score for "The Hateful Eight" (2016).

Although most of his work was made for Hollywood, Morricone never left his Italian hometown. He played his final tour dates in June 2019. He passed away last July, leaving behind a legacy of film scores and music, about which he once said:

"They're all my children... every score I've done."

Morricone is a cultural icon. He mastered speaking to the international audiences' hearts and minds. He made all the right and clever choices, when composing a rhythm, a melody or a harmony; all with the aim to complement a movie and, at the same time, instill life into musical pieces for them to live by their own.

Amman International Film Festival – Awal Film pays tribute to *il maestro*, with the "Jordanian Ensemble" performing some of his most famous compositions at the opening ceremony of its inaugural edition. As Morricone's music lives on, his tunes will certainly continue to inspire generations to come all over the world.

Jury Arab Feature Narrative Competition



Srdan Golubovic - Jury President

Srdan Golubovic (Belgrade, 1972) is a film director. His first feature film "Absolute Hundred" (2001) screened at festivals such as Toronto, San Sebastian, Pusan and Rotterdam, winning a great number of awards. His second film "The Trap" (2007) had its international premiere at the Berlinale Forum and was selected in several international film festivals, including Toronto and Karlovy Vary. It went on to win 22 international awards and made it to the final shortlist for the Academy Awards for Best Foreign Language Film. His third film "Circles" (2013) premiered at the Sundance Film Festival, winning the World Cinema Dramatic Special Jury Award, and screened at the Berlinale Forum, winning the award of the Ecumenical Jury. His newest film "Father" (2020) premiered at the Berlinale Panorama, winning both the Audience award and the Ecumenical Jury award. Golubovic teaches film directing at the Faculty of Dramatic Arts in Belgrade.



Sarim Fassi-Fihri

Since October 2014, Sarim Fassi-Fihri is the CEO of the Centre Cinématographique Marocain (The Moroccan Film Authority). He began his film career in 1982 and more precisely in film production. He is the owner and founder of CINEDINA film studios. He was President of the Moroccan Association of Film Producers from 1996 to 2014, and President of the Foundation of the Higher Institute of Audio-visual and Cinema Professions since 2005. He also served in the Board of the Marrakech International Film Festival from 2001 until 2008, and then became its Executive Vice-President in 2015. Fassi-Fihri has produced or coproduced several Moroccan feature films directed by Hakim Noury, Jilali Ferhati, Nabil Ayouch, Ahmed Boulane and Farida Belyazid. He executive produced more than 40 foreign feature films and TV series shot in Morocco.



Saba Mubarak

Saba Mubarak is mostly known as an actress, whose repertoire includes many successful works regionally and internationally, such as: "Two Girls from Egypt", "Transit Cities" and "Wedding Song". She founded her own production house – Pan East Media – which produced the award-winning feature "The Guest: Aleppo-Istanbul" in which she had a lead role. In 2019, she produced "Obour" TV series, in which she also starred. Her most recent works include the Jordanian feature narrative "Daughters of Abdulrahman" by Zaid Abu Hamdan, which she co-produced; and "Amira" by Mohamed Diab, where she co-stars along with Ali Suleiman. She has been selected as jury member in many renowned festivals.



Jury Arab Feature Documentary Competition

Andrea Luka Zimmerman - Jury President

Andrea Luka Zimmermanis a filmmaker and artist. Her work is concerned with marginalisation, co-existence, waywardness, social justice, and a search for radicalised re-relations, between people, place, and ecology. Her films include "Here for Life" (2019), which had its world premiere in the Cineasti Del Presente International Competition of the Locarno Film Festival, receiving a Special Mention, "Erase and Forget" (2017), which had its World Premiere at the Panorama section of the Berlin International Film Festival; "Estate, a Reverie" (2015) and "Taşkafa, Stories of the Street" (2013), written and voiced by the late John Berger.



Mahmoud Al Massad

Mahmoud AlMassad is a director and writer. He received international acclaim for his narrative and documentary feature films. His work was used in the curriculum of film academies in Europe. "Recycle" was awarded the World Cinema Cinematography Award Documentary at Sundance Film Festival in 2008 and was screened at over 130 international film festivals. His latest film "Blessed Benefit", which premiered in 2016 at Toronto International Film Festival, won the NETPAC Jury Award for the Best Asian film as well as Best Acting Award at Warsaw Film Festival in 2016.



Nadia Kamel

Nadia Kamel is an Egyptian filmmaker, writer, and producer. She worked as an assistant director to leading independent filmmakers in Egypt including Ateyyat El-Abnoudy, Youssef Chahine and Yousry Nasrallah. When Kamel first began to work on her own projects in 2000, she found that little space was left for new directors and that unconventional topics were confined to the margins of mainstream Egyptian discourse. Her award-winning first documentary "Salata Baladi" (an Egyptian Salad) was produced in the spirit of indomitable independence. Later, she directed and produced "Green Mirage", a documentary in Tunisia. Her most recent work, a novel "AlMawlouda" (Born), won the Sawiris prize for Best Novel in 2018. Kamel is currently working on a hybrid genre film about Egyptian youth in the early eighties.

Maysoon Pachachi - Jury President

Maysoon Pachachi is a London-based filmmaker of Iraqi origin. She studied Philosophy and Filmmaking and worked for many years as a film editor for documentary films, TV dramas and feature films in the UK. Since 1994, she has worked as an independent documentary film director and is currently completing post-production on "Kulshi Makoo", a feature narrative film shot in Iraq in 2019. Pachachi has also taught film directing and editing in Britain and Palestine. In 2004, she co-founded Independent Film & Television College, a free-of-charge film-training centrein Baghdad, which ran for 10 years and whose students produced 18 short documentary films that were shown internationally and received 14 festival prizes. Her documentary films include "Voices from Gaza", "Iraqi Women – Voices from Exile", "Iranian Journey" and "Open Shutters in Iraq".



Brandt Andersen

Brandt Andersen is a writer, director, and producer. In 2019, Andersen wrote and directed the narrative short "Refugee", which was shortlisted for the Academy Awards. Andersen has produced films such as "Everest" starring Jake Gyllenhaal, "Lone Survivor" starring Mark Wahlberg, "2 Guns" starring Denzel Washington and Mark Wahlberg, Martin Scorsese's "Silence" starring Adam Driver and "American Made" starring Tom Cruise.


Andersen has worked on humanitarian efforts specifically focused on assisting refugees. In 2017, in association with CARE, Andersen took a group of filmmakers to the Azraq refugee camp in Jordan to teach filmmaking to Syrian teenagers. From 1998 to 2005, Andersen founded and was CEO of uSight, a technology company. In 2005, Andersen sold the company and returned to school where he graduated with a BA in Fine Arts.




Najeh Hassan



Synopsis

In contemporary France, Stéphane recently joined the Anti-Crime Brigade in Montfermeil, the Paris suburbs where Victor Hugo had set his 1862 famed novel with the same title. Alongside his new colleagues Chris and Gwada, Stéphane quickly discovers tensions running high between neighbourhood gangs. When the trio find themselves overrun during an arrest, a drone captures every movement of the operation, setting in motion the events. Inspired by the 2005 Paris riots, "Les Misérables" exposes the tensions between the neighbourhood residents of the eastern suburb of Paris and the police department.

Director's Biography

Ladj Ly was born in Mali and grew up in Montfermeil, east of Paris. Best known for his attention-grabbing web documentaries that depict the realities of social and political life. He began his career as an actor and member of Kourtrajmé, an artist collective created in 1995 by his childhood friends, directors Kim Chapiron and Romain Gavras. Ly went on to direct his first short film, "Montfermeil Les Bosquets" in 1997. After the 2005 Paris riots, Ly was triggered by the death of two youths, and decided to film his neighbourhood for a year to make a documentary entitled "365 Days in Clichy-Montfermeil" (2007).



Synopsis

In 1982, at a private school in the mountains of Lebanon, 11-year-old Wissam is intent on finding the courage to tell his classmate he loves her, as an air invasion reaches the capital Beirutand shatters the school's calm. Wissam finds it difficult to comprehend the gravity of the impending violence. Butfor his teachers, Yasmineand Joseph, the jets in the sky signal something much graver.

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

This documentary is a chronicle of a revolution and war, experienced by the famous Syrian actor Fares Helou. Fares' life changed radically when he joined the people in the streets of Damascus calling for the fall of the Syrian regime. He immediately had to go underground, and director Rami Farah joined him in hiding with a camera. When Fares had to flee from Syria to France, Rami followed him. However, neither the actor nor the director had a script for the new chapter in their lives: exile. A chapter full of questions, disappointments and alienation, but also of absurdity and cultural confusion that calls for laughter. "A Comedian in a Syrian Tragedy" is an intimate observation of the psychological violence and the exiled existence experienced by the director and his favorite actor.

Director's Biography

Rami Farah is a Syrian filmmaker, actor and performer, born in 1980 and currently based in Paris. He first studied dance in Damascus at the High Institute for Dramatic Arts and has attended many training courses and workshops in contemporary film and dance. His first films and videos both use a blend of dance and audiovisual material. "ZamKan", made in 2004, unfolds as a dialogue between a ceiling fan and a chair in a silent room. It was followed by "Point", a short arts video that was screened in several exhibitions and festivals around the world.



The filmmaker chose to create this work as a letter to a father she never really knew, but it is also a warm and personal family tale with temperament and character. The big question remains, how has the father's disappearance affected the filmmaker's own life choices.

Lina Alabed is a Palestinian filmmaker, born in 1980, who graduated from the Faculty of Journalism at Damascus University. She worked with Danish directors on a documentary about Palestinian Refugees between Europe and the Middle East in 2009. Malek, the father of the filmmaker, told her nothing about his childhood in Algeria. Several years later, he revealed his story in a written script. The father and daughter finally made the journey to Mansourah, his home village: to see his house again, to meet other men who have experienced the same tearing. Little by little, the film reveals what Malek has experienced for a long time. During the war, more than two million people were displaced by the French Army and grouped in camps or villages. A distortion so far hidden from historical memory, for even if documented it remains largely ignored in France, but also in Algeria.

Director's Biography

Dorothée-Myriam Kellou is a journalist and filmmaker based in Paris. She uncovered in the French newspaper "Le Monde" in June 2016 the scandal of the French company Lafarge's indirect funding of the Islamic State during the war in Syria. Her work was rewarded with the TRACE International Prize for Investigative Reporting, which recognises reporting that uncovers bribery and transparency in the business world. She was also a finalist of Samir Kassir Award for the freedom of the press in the Arab world and of Albert Londres Award, one of the highest awards in French journalism.

The movie is a journey to the dark side of the Egyptian traditional folk weddings, as it tells the story of the belly dancers who perform during these events, and their complicated relations with their husbands, who happen to also manage their business. It is a world where personal feelings are at odds with work, shaping their destinies.


Director's Biography

He completed an apprenticeship as a typographer, and subsequently trained as a cameraman. He was an activist in the radical youth movement in the early 1980s in Zurich. Today, Samir is known for his unique fiction, documentary and experimental films, whose innovative characters drew attention at various festivals and won numerous awards. His 2019 film "Baghdad in My Shadow", won the Audience Award at the 2020 Solothurn Film Festival, as well as the Arabian Sights Audience Award at the 2019 Washington DC International Film Festival. In 2014, his documentary "Iraqi Odyssey", received the NETPAC Award at the Abu Dhabi Film Festival. While his 2002 documentary "Forget Baghdad", won him the Critics Week Award at the Locarno International Film Festival. His work to this day encompasses more than 40 short and feature-length films for cinema and television. Beside his own projects as an independent producer and director, he is also known for directing theatre plays and works in the field of visual arts.



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
