Early on, Amman Film Industry Days (AFID) established itself as a platform to amplify film's power, impact and role in advocating for causes as much as advocating for the film industry's growth. This year, we put our commitment to the festival's theme to the test, delving deep into the narrative's nuances. We aim to critically analyse the concept, ensuring individual and collective narratives are given importance.

We are thrilled to present a dynamic lineup at the pitching platforms and the Amman Projects Market, showcasing 16 films, including 5 narratives and 11 documentaries. After an intensive threeday pitching training with renowned expert Stefano Tealdi, these films will be judged by a distinguished jury of industry experts.

This year features the esteemed award-winning documentary filmmaker Hady Zaccak, who will explore the significance of archival documentaries in preserving and telling our stories. The renowned Pitch & Public Speaking Coach Bonnie Williams will impart her knowledge on networking and self-pitching at film festivals, while the experienced Thibaut Bracq, in partnership with EAVE, will discuss effective festival

strategies, ensuring a high-quality and insightful program.

We are proud to introduce new programs each year, and this year, we present "The Script Majlis", hosted by author and screenwriter Alexandra Viets. This program promises engaging insights and invaluable advice. Film critic and script editor Rasha Hosny, in collaboration with the Jordan Media Institute, leads a panel on film criticism. Additionally, Palestinian actor Ashraf Barhoum conducts an acting workshop for both actors and directors, focusing on effectively utilising the craft's tools.

This year's Industry Days also marks the debut of the AFID Incubator, a pilot program designed to support and inspire aspiring filmmakers. Participants will enjoy personalized and immersive experiences, meeting with industry experts who will offer invaluable guidance and insights, paving the way for their future success in the film industry.

Amman Film Industry Days continues to foster critical discussions and support filmmakers, ensuring that film remains a powerful tool for illuminating darkness, including the one shed by dogmas and lack of discernment.





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ABOUT THE AMMAN FILM INDUSTRY DAYS

The Amman Film Industry Days (AFID) offers a comprehensive program of masterclasses, workshops, panels, and networking opportunities to support filmmakers in Jordan and the region. It includes three pitching platforms for projects in development and postproduction, with a jury awarding in-kind and cash awards to winning projects. The Amman Film Market provides a dedicated space to connect filmmakers with potential funders, partners, and distributors, acting as a launchpad for projects to reach audiences. The market partners offer additional in-kind and cash awards to selected projects.

This year, new programs such as The Script Majlis and AFID Incubator will be introduced. Script Majlis is an interactive workshop where experts provide feedback to writers after actors perform one of their scenes. AFID Incubator, a pilot program, offers aspiring filmmakers a personalized and immersive experience during the festival, curating specialized meetings with industry experts to address their unique questions and challenges.

AFID will be held from July 4th to July 9th, 2024, marking our 5th edition.

Jihan El-TahriDirector, Writer, Visual Artist, and Producer
Egypt

Jihan El-Tahri is an award-winning director, writer, visual artist, and producer. In 2017, El-Tahri was invited to join the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (The Oscars) and has served on various selection committees, including those of the Locarno Film Festival, Jeune Création Francophone, Le Fonds Franco-Tunisien, and others. She has served on numerous juries, including as President of the Documentary Jury at FESPACO 2021. As a film mentor, she has worked with Focus Features (US), Documentary Campus (Germany), Ouaga Film Lab (Burkina Faso), Qumra (Qatar), Sud Ecriture (Tunisia), and other training labs. As a visual artist, she has exhibited in international biennials. El-Tahri started her career as a foreign correspondent in the Middle East. Since 1990, she has directed and produced documentaries for the BBC, PBS, Arte, and other international broadcasters. Her award-winning documentaries include Nasser, which premiered in the official selection at the Toronto International Film Festival, Behind the Rainbow, Cuba, an African Odyssey, and the Emmy-nominated House of Saud. Her writings include Les Sept Vies de Yasser Arafat and Israel and the Arabs: The 50 Years War. El-Tahri is engaged in various associations and institutions working with African cinema. She served as treasurer of the Guild of African Filmmakers in the Diaspora, an advisor on Focus Features' Africa First Program, and as regional secretary of the Federation of Pan-African Cinema (FEPACI).



Alice Kharoubi
Director of Cinema Programming
France

After completing her studies in France and the US, Alice Kharoubi joined the core team at the Festival de Cannes, where she managed Cannes Court Métrage. She later assumed the role of Short Film Programmer for the Abu Dhabi Film Festival and contributed to the programming team at the Festival Tous Écrans in Geneva. Currently, Alice serves as the Director of Cinema Programming at the Marché du Film and is a committee member for the Festival de Cannes Short Film Competition. Renowned for her mentorship of young filmmakers and project scouting, Alice also contributes to the Red Sea Film Festival as part of the programming team and as Head of Talent Days. In 2024, she was appointed as the Artistic Director for Meditalents.



Amin Matalqa
Director
Jordan

Amin Matalqa was born and raised in Jordan, then Ohio in the USA, and has been living in Los Angeles for the past 21 years. After graduating from the American Film Institute with an MFA in Directing in 2007, his first feature film Captain Abu Raed won the Sundance Film Festival World Audience Award in 2008 and became Jordan's first Oscar entry for Best Foreign Language Film. His next film was Walt Disney Studio's first Arabic language feature, the soccer drama, The United starring Farouk Al-Fishawy and Waleed Zuaiter. This was followed by the romantic comedy, Strangely In Love featuring Amanda Plummer (Pulp Fiction); and the action adventure, The Rendezvous, starring Stana Katic (Castle). In television, Amin wrote on and directed episodes of the Netflix supernatural show, Jinn. Most recently, he directed Sony's 5000 Blankets starring Anna Camp (Pitch Perfect). Amin is an alumnus of the ABC/DGA TV Directors program and teaches directing at the American Film Institute and Elon University between films.



Nicolas Wadimoff
Director and Producer
Switzerland

Born in 1964 in Geneva, Switzerland, Nicolas Wadimoff studied cinema in Montreal before debuting his first film, "Le Bol," at Locarno in 1991. After The Golden Gloves of Akka, a portrait of a Palestinian boxer that premiered at Locarno and made the festival circuit in 1992, he directed the feature-length award-winning drama Clandestins in 1997. Since then, Wadimoff has been working as both director and producer, earning accolades at Cannes, Venice, Berlin, and Toronto. In 2003, he founded Akka Films. Noteworthy projects include the documentary "Aisheen: Still Alive in Gaza" in 2010 and the fiction "Opération Libertad" in 2012, premiered at Cannes. In 2015, his documentary "Spartiates" won the prestigious "Prix de Soleure," followed by "Jean Ziegler, l'optimisme de la volonté" in 2016, premiered at Locarno. His latest, "The Apollo of Gaza," opened the Critics' Week in Locarno in 2018. After leading the Film Department at HEAD-Geneva from 2019-2023, Wadimoff returns to directing, preparing his next feature in Marseille, while continuing his passion for producing meaningful projects.



Jana Wehbe
Film Maker and Producer
Lebanon

Jana Wehbe studied filmmaking at Université Saint-Joseph in Beirut and oriental modern singing at the Lebanese National Higher Conservatory of Music. Her producing career began with the film 2 ½, which won the FIPRESCI Award at DIFF 2010. She went on to produce feature documentaries and fiction films, as well as line-produce several coproductions. In 2009, she co-founded 'The Attic,' a production boutique with like-minded film professionals. In 2011, Jana joined the Doha Film Institute as part of the institute's annual festivals team. She also served as a professor teaching film production and acted as the Arab Film Institute's representative in Lebanon. In addition to her expertise in music artist management, Jana has been diversifying her interests by bringing productions to theater and musical stages. Recently, she was selected among four other Arab female filmmakers to receive the inaugural AFAC-Netflix Equity Fund. She is currently serving as the Executive Director of the REEF Festival (Rural Encounters on Environment and Film).

Born in Johannesburg (South Africa) in 1955, he established Stefilm in Torino, Italy in 1991 where he develops, produces and/or directs drama and documentary film features and series.

His recent productions are: A Bastard and Pinochet's Legacy by Pepe Rovano (Special Mention, Sanfic 2023); Amor by Virginia Eleuteri Serpieri (Mostra del Cinema di Venezia 2023, IDFA Lumina 2023); Snajka: A Diary of Expectations by Tea Vidović Dalipi (Human Rights Day – Sarajevo FF 2023); Rispet feature length fiction film by Cecilia Bozza Wolf (Bolzano, Trento and Sestri Levante film festivals 2023); When We Were Bullies by Jay Rosenblatt (short doc, Academy Award nomination 2022); Exemplary Behaviour (Golden Dove DOK Leipzig, FIPRESCI and Interreligious Award 2019); My Home, in Libya (Locarno Film festival, DOK Leipzig, Chicago Int. Film Festival 2018, Premio Corso Salani - Trieste FF e Best Doc Glocal - Torino 2019), Wonderful Losers. He co-wrote Food Makers Go Global (5 x 26' series produced with mdr/arte, 2018), Coffee Please and Tea For All (2 episodes of the global drinks series co-produced with France 5); Doctor Ice (co-produced with zdf/arte), A World of Pasta (co-produced with artline films e France 5); The Arrival of the Angel (in the Piemonte Stories series); Tougher Than The Rest; Eritrea: The Red Land.

He tutors on production, storytelling and pitching for: Biennale Cinema and VR College Venice, Amman Film Industry, Marchè du Film Cannes, Documentary Campus, ESoDoc, La Fabrique Cinémas - Institute Francais, Factory, Films de 3 Continents - Produire au Sud, Imagination - Arab Film Scriptwriting, Jump In - Poitiers FF, Ouga Film Lab, Red Sea Lodge, TFL-Torino Film Lab, Scuola Holden, ZELIG Film School.

Mervat Aksoy is a Creative Producer from Jordan. She works in the development of series and films, and in end-to-end production. Her career began at The Royal Film Commission - Jordan in 2003, which ignited her passion for the local and regional film industry. In 2010, she graduated with an MFA in Cinematic Arts from the Red Sea Institute of Cinematic Arts and went on to produce regional film, television, and web content. Since 2020, she has been working in the UAE, developing original content with studios and platforms based in the region.



Mehdi Hmili Director, Screenwriter, and Producer Tunisia

Mehdi Hmili, a Tunisian director, screenwriter, and producer, studied cinema in Paris. His early works include three short films shot in France: X-Moment, Li-La, and The Night of Badr, focusing on themes of love and exile. In 2016, he debuted with Thala Mon Amour, a love story set against the Tunisian revolution. Alongside Moufida Fedhila, he co-founded "Yol Film House" in Tunis, producing fiction films and documentaries showcased at international festivals. Hmili gained recognition at Cannes Film Festival's La Fabrique de Cinémas du Monde in 2019 with his documentary Fouledh. His second feature, Streams, premiered at the 74th Locarno Film Festival, garnering accolades such as Best Acting Performance at the Cairo International Film Festival and the Special Jury Award at the Kolkata International Film Festival. He further received Best Actress and Best Actor Awards at the Vues d'Afrique International Film Festival, and a Best Director Award at the Malmö Arab Film Festival. A pivotal figure in Tunisia's cinema, Hmili actively supports local talent through "Yol Film House", fostering coproduction and international distribution opportunities. He is an alumnus of Torino Film Lab and Film Independent, dividing his time between Tunisia and Paris.

Synopsis

A few days before the wedding, the groom, who came from Sweden to the Zaatari camp, cancels their marriage plans, shocking Amal. Amal faces threats of murder from her ex-husband. At the same time, her family is forced to leave the camp to a nearby village. Amal intervenes to protect her younger sister from a new child marriage. She seeks safety and security despite their harsh circumstances.



Director's Biography **Khaled Alkhaldi**

A Syrian cinematographer, he migrated to Jordan in 2011. With an early passion for cinema, he studied at the SAE Institute in Amman, earning a filmmaking diploma. Since 2021, he has worked as a cinematographer for documentary films like The Harvesters' Moon and Concrete Land. He also collaborated with the Royal Film Commission on The Queen and the Deputy 2024. His work has taken him across Jordan, from southern deserts to northern regions and refugee camps like Zaatari. He admires filmmakers such as Andrei Tarkovsky."



In 2011, my family and I were displaced to Jordan due to the war. We settled in an urban village that suffered from drug abuse, violence, and child marriage. We decided to forcibly marry my underage sister to her cousin, who abused drugs. My sister divorced and returned with her children. I felt responsible for that. When I met Amal, I felt that her story reflect my sister's experience. It was my duty to support Amal in sharing her story to find safety and a future. I became deeply engaged with Amal's story and tried to build an impact campaign.




Producer's Note Rahmeh Al-Shmmas

Despite no familial ties to "Amal," the main character, the director Khaled and writer Lujain share the same Syrian origin and a long-time friendship. This connection helped create a deep, authentic portrayal in the film. Despite challenges such as obtaining filming permits for the Zaatari camp, which usually take 21 days, and limited funding, filming has continued since December 2023. Our team believes in the importance of telling Amal's story, which reflects the lives of many girls and women in the Arab world.

Goals of Participating:

Our participation in the Amman Film Festival aims to build relationships with influential producers and highly experienced directors, exchanging expertise and knowledge. Additionally, we seek financial funding to cover production costs for the film and establish partnerships with media outlets specialized in distribution and promotion. We want to explore other opportunities offered by the festival.

After reading a book by Iman Mersal, Leen and Lina are left with a burning question: what might an archive of mothering look like? Embarking on a quest to create such an archive, they turn to their mothers, Nabeela and Nahed. Quickly Leen and Lina realize that like most silenced narratives, mothering cannot be easily grasped. Embracing the contradictions that arise from intimate dialogues, they contemplate possible explanations. Traversing family

& official archives, media materials, and everyday conversations with mothers and one other, this documentary tells an intimate story of two friends trying to capture mothering in its fullness and complexity.



Director's
Biography
Leen Ghassan

Born and raised in Amman, Leen is a visual and cultural anthropologist. Leen received her BA in Sociology and Gender Studies from New College of Florida, and her MA in Arab Studies from Georgetown University. Currently pursuing a PhD at George Washington University, Leen's research focuses on labor regimes, alienation, and intimacy using combined methods such as film and conventional ethnography. In addition to her academic career, Leen is part of Darkroom Amman, an analog photography space where she runs popular education programming.

Director's Intention

For someone who never desired motherhood, Nabeela still mothers poetically - a puzzle I'm not sure I will ever figure out. Neither will this documentary, which paradoxically is and is not about my mother. When Iman Mersal wrote of her mothering journey, she curiously named her book HowtoMend:MotherhoodanditsGhosts, intimating a spectral haunting that lives with and through the wounds of motherhood as ideal and mothering as experienced. Experiences with my mother, and the intimate history Mersal narrates, sparked my anthropological interest in the interior worlds of motherhood. This documentary seeks to explore them, portraying our mothers in their fullness and complexity.



Producer's Note Lina Khalid

This film sheds light on the experience of motherhood from various perspectives, including my mother and Leen's mother's perspectives, exploring visual archives, and representations of motherhood in popular discourse. As a documentary photographer and archivist, I strive to bring a visual and archival aspect to any project I work on. I believe our constant return to archives, whether personal or public, helps us identify, correct, or affirm our identities and social realities. In this documentary film, my role is to assist Leen in weaving a unique narrative about motherhood that captures viewers' attention and sparks questions about experiences of mothering.

Yazan Taiseer, a Jordanian-Palestinian visual artist and filmmaker based in Amman, was born in 1992 and pursued his studies in the College of Media at Petra University. Together with fellow artists, Yazan co-founded the artistic collective "Amman Films." Within this group, he has played a vital role in curating public film presentations and engaging in open cinematic discussions, all while producing several works with limited budgets. Currently, Yazan delves into various collective and individual projects that explore the intertwined and separate concepts of death, homeland, and memory.

Director's Intention

All films are love letters in one way or another, and this film is no different. When a person dies, their narrative loses control over their memory, and the narratives of others take over this memory. What could be a greater thing to send in your love letter to a deceased person than to restore their memory to them? Perhaps this brings them back to life, at least for the duration of this letter.



Producer's Note Noor Arafeh

I might have personal feelings connected to the subject of the film but looking beyond the specifics and the magic in viewing the work as a product, materially, this film constitutes a unique cinematic case in presenting works related to the filmmaker himself. Producing a documentary film with a cinematic language and a narrative that is almost magical and fantastical is what piques my greatest interest.

Synopsis

Anesthesiologist Tayseer, who adores his wife's perfume, loses his sense of smell after her passing. The scent of death becomes all he can perceive, pervading his life due to his neighbor's occupation washing the deceased in his apartment. The smell of death becomes a poignant reminder of his loss, grappling with the overwhelming scent while struggling to shield his young daughter from the truth of her mother's death. Tayseer's desperation

leads him towards thoughts of suicide, but his daughter's reminder of her own scent, reminiscent of her mother's, grounds him. With her help, he breaks free from the grip of the deathly perfume and embraces life. ('Perfume of death: the scent sprayed on the deceased to mask any unpleasant odors.)



Director's Biography **Mohammad Khabour**

Mohammad Khabour heads the Performing Arts Department at the Institute of Fine Arts. He started in university theater, then wrote and directed short films. His latest, "Red Dish," screened at the Malmo Film Festival and competed in the Asia Festival in Yogyakarta. Khabour's debut TV series, "Led Jay," earned a development grant from the Film Support Fund and was part of the RFC series laboratory 'Moslslat'. He's also directed numerous short documentaries, including "Al-Manaih," which won 8 awards at festivals like Berlin Short Film Festival, Los Angeles Independent Film Awards, and Calcutta Festival.



Producer's Note Hadeel Lawi

The uniqueness of our story is our focal point in bringing this film to the screen. It explores the profound experience of losing what connects us most to this world. It delves into the highly sensitive matter of loss and the emotional journey of finding hope to carry on despite feeling entirely stagnant, as if a part of our soul has departed. This tangible drama is infused with a sense of dry comedy that intertwines with the catastrophes, serving as a reminder that there is always a reason to persevere. Through our protagonist, portrayed by Eyad Nassar, we will uncover the resilience and determination to move forward

Director's Intention

Scents and their hidden meanings, along with their relationship to nostalgia for the past, the suffering of the present, and hope for the future, are the most important inspirations behind my writing of this film. Smell, being one of the most evocative and poignant products of the human imagination, holds immense significance. There is nothing in this universe without a scent. When I lost my friend, the artist Ashraf Talfah, and sat beside his body during the funeral, the fragrance of his perfume lingered in my memory from our last meeting. This experience made me realize that the scent of a deceased person's perfume is the most beautiful memory that can remind us of the presence of those we have lost. Let our imagination weave scents even for things we believe have no fragrance.

Director's Biography Naji Ismail

Naji Ismail, born in 1983 in Cairo's Ain Shams neighborhood, later moved to Upper Egypt before returning to Cairo to study at the Higher Cinema Institute. In 2010, he earned a documentary filmmaking scholarship from George Washington University. In 2012, he established "Rahala Production and Distribution". Naji's short documentary, "Om Amira," screened at Berlinale 2014, followed by his short fiction, "The Builders," at the Dubai Film Festival in 2016. For Deya, running is a human right. Deya's love for running is a sort of peaceful reaction to human rights being disrespected or freedoms being violated. Running is like a metaphor for life, an ultimate way to break away from an established order, to not give in, to allow oneself to create their own inner and outer space. Symbolically, Deya is re-establishing the borders of his country through the paths he chooses to take, while creating his own running space.



This two-day workshop addresses the use of archives in documentary cinema. We start from the research phase, exploring all types of materials such as photographs, newspapers, documents (letters, memoirs), paintings, news footage, home movies, and fictional films... as well as the process of audio research: oral memory, news, songs, voice messages. Then, we move on to how to write and integrate these materials into the film's composition, considering the context of the materials used, the adopted perspective, and the historical role. We reach the final product where creative, ethical, and production choices also intertwine. The workshop is based on Hady Zaccak's personal experience, allowing an insight into the backstage of research, usage choices, and the use of different examples and varied approaches, as well as a self-review process. In this context, specific film models with archival content are deconstructed. Thus, we gradually delve into the various forms of using archives, leading up to the archive film itself.
