After a long journey, we have come together to gather projects, stories, and ideas for the awards at this year's Amman Film Industry Days (AFID). With a record of some 150 submissions from 16 countries— almost twice the number of last year—the selection process exhibited the extraordinary talent and improved quality emerging from our film community, making the final choices a daunting task.

We selected 18 projects from eight different countries, all tackling personal stories that explore themes of identity and the narratives surrounding refugees and displacement. The films range from genre pieces to social dramas, each illuminating the complexities of the human experience.

As part of our commitment to fostering creativity in Amman, we have enhanced our pitching platform this year, offering more cash and in-kind awards through partnerships. We hope these resources will provide emerging filmmakers with valuable exposure and support for their projects. Our workshops showcase various voices and cinematic visions, creating opportunities for learning and idea exchange. Participants will gain tools, skills, and insights to thrive in an "unscripted world." We will also host a masterclass with the cinematic legend Yousra. Highlights will also include the Actors roundtable with Georges Khabbaz and Alexandra Viets' Script Mailis, aimed at inspiring performances and storytelling. Additionally, there will be technical workshops such as the DocSafe roundtable on safety in documentary filming - an essential conversation for filmmakers tackling sensitive subjects - and EAVE On Demand's session on leveraging AI tools to enhance storytelling with digital technology. "The Unreal Experience" will also offer hands-on training on using Unreal Engine for hybrid storytelling with Samir.

This year's theme, "A World Unscripted," celebrates achievements born from long struggles and has led us to explore uncharted territories. As AFID kicks off, it invites parallels with the world of football. Both cinema and football embody hard work, strategy, and performance, allowing audiences to experience the emotions and unpredictability inherent in great films and thrilling matches. Both fields share universal appeal, transcending borders and uniting people regardless of background or culture. In his ideal position as President of the Jordan Football Association and Chairman of the Board of the Royal Film Commission, HRH Prince Ali Bin Al Hussein will join us to explore the intersection between cinema and football.

Life, much like art, often defies expectations. What unscripted story will you contribute with to our collective narrative? What unique perspective will you bring to our discussions this year? We hope this year's AFID program allows filmmakers to articulate and share our experiences of human connection with the world.









Reclaiming Chaos: Cinema as a Response to an Unstable World

In a world riddled with fractures, from economic instability to cultural displacement, from war to silence, storytelling becomes both a fragile act and a defiant gesture. At Amman Film Industry Days (AFID), we've always believed that cinema is more than a mirror; it is a compass. And this year, under the theme A World Unscripted, we embrace uncertainty not as a flaw in storytelling, but as its very foundation.

Gone are the days when every story needed a perfect arc, a clear genre and a tidy resolution. Today's filmmakers are not looking to control the narrative; they are here to observe it, disrupt it, sometimes just survive it. What we have witnessed in this year's edition are works shaped by fragmentation, contradiction and urgency. Films shaped in spaces where truth and imagination blur, where identity is constantly redefined, and where form refuses to settle.

These are stories shaped by absence, memory, grief, and resistance. Stories that challenge inherited masculinities and return to places we're told to forget. Some use silence. Some use humour. Some rage. But no one asks for permission.

At the Industry Days, we take pride in creating a space where this kind of raw, unscripted vision is not only welcomed but also needed. Through our Development and Post-Production platforms, and through new initiatives like "The Spark Series", we continue to support filmmakers who may not yet have all the answers but know the right questions to ask.

In that spirit, we mark a special milestone: the return of two projects once pitched at AFID "Yalla Parkour" (1st edition) and "Seeking Haven for Mr. Rambo" (5th edition), now completed and premiering to festival audiences. Their evolution from rough ideas to cinematic realities is a testament to the purpose of such a platform: to accompany filmmakers through uncertainty, and to trust that the story will reveal itself in time.

To all the filmmakers who joined us this year and to those still finding the courage to begin welcome! Your stories, however unfinished or fragile, are essential. In your chaos, we find clarity. In your fragments, we find truth.

Let's keep reclaiming it together.

AFID features three competitive pitching platforms for projects in development and post-production, with a professional jury granting both in-kind and cash awards to selected winners.

Now in its fourth edition, the Amman Film Market continues to serve as a vibrant hub connecting filmmakers with potential funders, partners, and distributors. Acting as a launchpad for new projects, the market also offers additional in-kind cash awards through its strategic industry partners.

This year, AFID launches a new pilot initiative: The Spark: Web Series Showcase, highlighting bold and innovative voices from Jordan and the Arab world. The showcase is dedicated to creators reimagining episodic storytelling, featuring web series that break away from traditional formats and leverage online platforms to engage broader and more diverse audiences.

In addition, AFID will present a curated selection of panels, workshops, and masterclasses led by experienced and acclaimed film professionals, offering valuable insights into the art and craft of filmmaking, as well as current industry trends and challenges.

Together, these platforms and initiatives reflect AFID's ongoing commitment to nurturing creative talent and empowering the next generation of storytellers in the Arab region.

AFID will be held from July 2nd to July 9th, 2025, marking our 6th edition.

Dora Bouchoucha

Film Producer Tunisia

A Tunisian film producer since 1994. She has produced and co-produced several awardwinning documentaries, short and feature films including "Satin Rouge", "Buried Secrets" and "Foreign Body" by Raja Amari, "Inhebbek Hedi", "Weldi" and "Behind the Mountains" by Mohamed Ben Attia.

Bouchoucha founded the SUD ECRITURE workshops in 1997, which she has been running since. She also founded the Carthage Film Festival (JCC) Projects' workshop in 1992 and headed JCC in 2008, 2010 and 2014. Moreover, she was the director of Manarat, Mediterranean festival in Tunisia in 2018, 2019 and 2021.

Bouchoucha is twice decorated by the Tunisian Republic to the highest rank of Grand Officer of the Republic and was awarded the Tahar Haddad Award for best Ambassador of Tunisian culture.

In Cannes 2015, she was named Commander of Arts and Letters by the French Minister of Culture. In addition to have been named member of the Commission for Individual Freedoms and Equality (COLIBE) by the President of the Republic of Tunisia in 2017.



Eduardo Guillot

Artistic Director Spain

Eduardo Guillot has worked as a cultural journalist for more than thirty years and is the author of more than twenty books on topics related to culture. Member of the programming team at València Cinematheque from 2000 to 2006. International programming advisor for more than ten years at Abycine (Albacete) and Cinema Jove film festivals. Guillot was the Artistic Director of Mostra de València-Cinema del Mediterrani International Film Festival from 2018 to 2024, and now he's working as a technical advisor for Humans Fest and a member in FEPRISCI.

Synopsis

From Temporary to Semi-Permanent is a quiet, observational documentary exploring life in Palestinian refugee camps across Jordan. Through intimate, unhurried visuals, the film captures the everyday rhythms of camp life while reflecting on themes of memory, exile, and place. It explores how time is experienced and remembered in spaces built to be temporary but have grown into complex, layered environments. Without narration or generalizations, the film lets the environment speak for itself—where permanence is fragile, waiting persists, and identity is sustained through presence, repetition, and the subtle details of daily life.



Director's Biography Bayan Abuta'ema Director's Intention

A Palestinian filmmaker, photo-video journalist, and storyteller based in Jordan. She holds a BA in Radio and Television and is a self-taught filmmaker drawn to personal, political, and visually driven narratives. Her work focuses on themes of displacement, identity, and collective memory, often rooted in the Palestinian experience. In 2021, she received awards from PLURAL+ and the United for Peace Film Festival, along with several other nominations, for her short film Error 017. This film is my personal exploration of Palestinian refugee camps in Jordan—places where memory lives on and identity is constantly questioned. Through quiet everyday moments and the voices of ordinary people, I want to share how these spaces hold stories of belonging amid uncertainty, inviting viewers to connect with a deeper sense of home, history, and the layered reality of exile.

Director's Biography Kinda Kurdi

An award-winning filmmaker and TV producer with 16 years' experience creating documentaries and animation across multi-platforms. Her work has aired on various channels, including broadcast credits spanning the BBC, Cartoon Network, Channel 4 News, Ro'ya, and KTV.

Kinda's latest mid-length documentary is currently airing on Channel 4, Guns, Gangs and Second Chances, and is available on the 4 On Demand streaming platform. Her previous documentary short, As Above So Below, garnered her an award for Best Documentary Short at the EIFF Festival and was shortlisted at festivals in London, Venice, and the United States. Director's Intention

This film is an extension of a legacy bestowed on me by my father, who is also a filmmaker, as the original exclusive interview with the mayor was filmed by him before I was born. My vision for the film is twofold: firstly, to link the past with the present and catalyse fundamental change in the perception of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict by providing insights into its true origins and the history of the struggle. But beyond that, I hope the life stories, ambitions, and sacrifices embodied by our main characters will create empathy, understanding, and admiration for the Palestinian people.



Producer's Note Brian Hill

It is often said that the past allows us to better understand the present and to think about the future. This is the case with The Last Mayor of Jerusalem, which, through its original cinematographic approach and the unique testimony of the last mayor of Jerusalem—filmed before the occupation of the city by Israel during the Six-Day War—brings to life a key moment in the history of this region. It is a look back at a political decision that still lies at the heart of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Synopsis

Based on an actual event on November 25, 1987. Four young Arab resistance fighters/ freedom fighters abandoned their lives to set off on hang gliders from Mount Hermon in South Lebanon to carry out an armed struggle operation on an Israeli military camp in northern occupied Palestine. One of the four fighters penetrated the military camp unchallenged and carried out a courageous act, killing six Israeli soldiers before being martyred. The next day, young Palestinians took to the streets in uproar, inscribing graffiti reading "6:1" on Israeli building walls.

The First Intifada broke out a month after this operation.



Director's Biography Tamir Naber

Tamir Naber is an award-winning Jordanian director, driven by a passion for stories of identity, belonging, and heritage. His work spans short films (Wonderful World, Define Over), award-winning commercials (IKEA Recipes, Samsung VR), and eight seasons directing Ahlan Simsim (Arabic Sesame Street). Tamir has also served as an assistant director on major global productions, including The Hurt Locker (2008) and Star Wars: Episode IX (2019). As a producer, his film The Chant (2024) earned multiple international awards. Tamir's cinematic vision bridges cultures, celebrating Arab stories with global impact. Director's Intention

I was drawn to this project by its powerful, real-life story—how freedom fighters from across the Arab world united to defy the odds in an extraordinary mission. My vision as a director is to bring heart, depth, and raw emotion to this film—revealing the humanity behind the mission: their hopes, fears, and quiet dreams. My long-standing experience with large-scale productions and storytelling will help shape a narrative that moves audiences, reminding them of the resilience of the human spirit and the power of unity in the face of oppression.



Producer's Note **Ghassan Salti**

I was a young adult in 1987 when I first heard about this story.

At the time, I didn't fully grasp the weight of what had happened. But as the details of the operation emerged, and as history unfolded, it became clear that this moment was more than just a military act—it was a spark.

This got me thinking: Who were these people? What drove them to risk everything? The more I learned, the more I felt a deep responsibility to tell this story—not just as a historical event, but as a human story of resistance, Arab nationalism, and sacrifice.

Director's Biography Murad Abu Eisheh

Director's Intention

Murad Abu Eisheh is a Jordanian filmmaker and member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. His breakout short Tala'vision won over 70 international awards, including a Student Academy Award and a shortlist spot for the 94th Oscars. His follow-up, A Calling. From the Desert. To the Sea, deepened his exploration of patriarchal control, resistance, and emotional repression in the Arab world. Murad's films blend urgency and lyricism, confronting injustice through intimate, character-driven narratives. His cinematic voice remains rooted in Arab realities, yet resonates globally with its emotional clarity and quiet, defiant power. The Orange Grove is a deeply personal adaptation, rooted in my own experience abroad and the struggle to reclaim one's true self. I envision the film as a psychological thriller, where the tension of Aziz's unraveling identity is reflected in the rhythm of the present and echoes of his past. Through immersive visuals and a raw approach to performance, I want to pull the audience into Salim's fractured world—where theatre is not just a stage but a battleground for truth. I aim to create a film that journeys through brotherhood, loss, and the search for inner peace.



Producer's Note **Rula Nasser**

The Orange Grove is an international co-production led by acclaimed Canadian producer Roger Frappier (The Power of the Dog), in partnership with Jordan and Germany under official co-production treaties. Based on Larry Tremblay's bestselling novel—a staple in Quebec schools—the project is unique in reversing the usual dynamic by bringing Arab partners into a Western-led production from the outset.

With Le Pacte handling international sales and MAD Solutions onboard for the MENA region, the film has strong market momentum. Directed by Jordanian-German filmmaker Murad Abu Eisheh, it represents a rare East-West collaboration rooted in authenticity, reciprocity, and a shared creative vision.

Synopsis

Assia, a 30 year-old French-Algerian, just broke up with her long-time American partner, with whom she lived in New York City. In a state of confusion, she questions her life choices and her desire to become a mother. It's summertime, and she decides to join her parents, Amina and Farid, in Spain as they just opened a restaurant popular seaside resort near Alicante. Arriving at the airport in Alicante, Assia has no idea what she's in for. What was meant to be a family vacation turns into a rescue operation for a fragile business and a shaky family equilibrium.



Director's Biography Lina Soualem

After studying History and Political Science at La Sorbonne University, Lina worked as a programmer. Lina's debut feature documentary Their Algeria premiered in Visions du Réel 2020. Lina acted in four feature films and contributed to the writing of the TV series Oussekine (Disney+). Her second documentary, Bye Bye Tiberias premiered in 2023 in Venice International Film Festival. The film was chosen to represent Palestine at the Oscars 2024, was nominated as Best Documentary at the 2024 Film Independent Spirit Awards, at the European Film Awards 2024 and at the 2025 César in France. Director's Intention

Alicante allows me to explore themes that interest me : transmission in exile, colonial trauma, finding your place in the world as a woman, mother, daughter. I chose Spain as it's very inspiring visually. Alicante is full of Algerians and it faces Oran in Algeria, on the other side of the Mediterranean. Algeria in the film appears through language, conversations and symbols. As an absent that is constantly present. The film's tone oscillate between family drama and dramatic comedy, because in all our family stories, sometimes it's only humor that save us —or at least allow us to keep up appearances.



Producer's Note **Omar El Kadi**

I had the chance to collaborate with Lina on her previous films, which I distributed across the Arab world. The films resonated deeply in the region, and our friendship deepened through shared travels and conversations about exile, identity, and cultural balance.

What interests us in Alicante is deconstructing stereotypes around the representation of Algerians in France, often linked to suburbs or integration struggles. Lina chose to show a different reality. Filming a French-Algerian family in Spain restores their right to complexity, portraying them not in opposition to an identity or a place, but simply as expatriates adapting to a new environment. Alicante furthers our artistic and political engagement.

Ping-Pong was born out of our suffocating reality. The constant hum of warplanes reminded us of collective grief. Amidst despair emerged resilience. Slowly we found ways to cope. It began with shared silence, watching the news together with wordless dread. We sought distractions: philosophical conversations, card games and ping-pong. These moments became lifelines, letting us momentarily escape reality, they were not denial but survival - ways to reclaim humanity and find joy together. Ping-Pong reflects this duality, the tension between human connection's warmth and grief's crushing weight.



Producer's Note May Jabareen

Ping-Pong captures a familiar state: wrestling with grief, trauma, and war's echoes. In Issam's turmoil, I see what many have faced - some coping, others searching for calm amid chaos. Saleh explores intimate, human moments - ritual, laughter, play - as quiet acts of resilience. He brings tenderness to the portrayal of Palestinian resilience. Sound is central: not background, but emotional force, from warplanes' thrum to the ping-pong's rhythm, connecting memory, presence and hope. We want audiences to feel Issam's world. We often put ourselves in situations that pushed the limits of humor to the point of absurdity, trying to catch up with the delay. This delay echoes throughout the film across different age groups. Printemps portrays a break from that cycle: a bold, free story in tone and form.

The script, titled The Cow Thief, was written by Kamal Selim, a pioneer of Egyptian realism, who died under suspicious circumstances decades earlier. Zidan's journey takes him to Italy, where he

meets Bruno, the estranged son of Imam, a

former Egyptian associate suspected of both stealing the script and being involved in Selim's death. As Zidan uncovers archival evidence and confronts the sons of renowned Italian directors, tensions rise. His creative methods blur the line between fact and fiction, pushing collaborators away and threatening the project. Haunted by questions of censorship, cultural erasure, and artistic freedom, Zidan must decide whether to abandon the film or confront the uncomfortable truths he has uncovered.



Director's Biography Mohamed Zedan

Mohamed Zidan is an Egyptian director, producer, and editor based in Alexandria. A graduate of the Jesuit Film School, he has worked in cinema since 2010 and participated in the Sharjah Biennial. He is the founder of Rufy's Film Production and teaches film history while supporting emerging filmmakers. His co-directed debut, The Mice Room, screened at Dubai and São Paulo festivals. His documentary I Have a Picture won awards at El Gouna, the National Film Festival, and Sharjah Film Platform.

The Cow Thief is a documentary born from a fleeting mention that led to a long investigation into a forgotten cinematic project. Rather than accuse, it reflects on missed possibilities and the barriers visible and invisible—that prevent creative visions from reaching light. The Cow Thief is a cinematic game, an investigation, a mirror through which we reexamine our collective memory, our relationship with authority, the West, and ourselves. It is not a call to believe or deny but a call to think,

to question, to dismantle—grounded in evidence and driven by sincere doubt.

His struggle feels painfully relevant today, as imagination remains constrained by fear and control. This satirical yet emotional journey sheds light on an Arab crisis with global resonance—blending truth, absurdity, and dark humor. This "original sin" curses his bloodline for three generations. The film builds its own mythological universe, drawing from my grandmother's tales and global legends. I reimagine these to explore taboo themes like religion, tradition, patriarchy, gender roles, sex, love, and power—creating a world that resonates independently, without relying on specific cultural references.



Jad Chahine was casting director for two of Yousry Nasrallah's recent projects—a testament to his talent. When he presented his film-school project, The Call of the Brook, nominated for the Cinefondation Award at the 76th Cannes Film Festival, it was clear he had a bold vision. Lebanon's history is fractured—there is no official account of the 1975 civil war. We wear masks to survive in a society where warlords became politicians. My film delves into this tension.

This film is not my first collaboration with Christy. I previously produced Appel en Absence, which we shot in Toulouse. Christy has a distinctive style in her work: she approaches dramatic subjects with finesse and levity, often using sarcasm and dark humor. This unique tone is what best defines her debut feature film.

The film explores the love-hate relationship that Chady—like many others—feels toward Lebanon, a place both fascinating and tormented, still ruled by the same warlords decade after decade. Chady reflects too the emotional struggle that Lebanese independent artists endure.

What intrigues me most in filmmaking is the filmmaker's adventure in creating an alternative cinematic form, intellectual content, or production model.

This film embarks on that adventure on all three levels. It raises questions about memory—an often neglected theme in Egyptian cinema. Consequently, in its artistic form, it aspires to experiment with a new cinematic language that blends different mediums to explore the nature of memory.

You Don't Die Two Times is my first creative documentary, born from the desire to move beyond journalistic objectivity and explore a more sensitive, personal, and aesthetic form of storytelling. Inspired by analog photography and the chiaroscuro of Renaissance painting, I use images as vessels of emotion and meaning.

The film follows Gift, a Nigerian migrant, whose journey is part of a broader and tragic contemporary history. By blending documentary reality with the symbolism of the Egyptian Book of the Dead, I aim to transform a personal path into a universal myth—evoking empathy by revealing the deep humanity behind migration stories.
